All I need to do now is finish that wheel, do the same, to the other front wheel, then check the rear wheel that I have been putting off since the Tech Day two months ago and then, get this, I have to replace all four of my new tires because of a manufacturer's defect.


<u>Did You Know:</u>. Adult cats only meow at humans, not other cats.

1924 Seal Tricar

Seal, named for "Safe, Economical And Light", were motorcycles produced by Haynes and Bradshaw (founded in 1906) from 1912 to 1920 and then until 1924 by Seal Motors Ltd. in Hulme, Manchester.

In a time when the sidecar was the only economical alternative to the car and to offer a level of protection similar to these, the Seal proposed a set where the driver was installed in the sidecar, together with the passenger. Thus between 1912 and 1924 this unusual machine classified as a "Sociable" with three wheels was offered. This was a special form of motorcycle with a sidecar that had been extended to carry the driver and passengers, while the mechanical components were separate. It was driven by a JAP V-twin engine with a three-speed gearbox mounted on a frame built from straight tubing and with the front fork connected to a steering wheel in the sidecar.


Automotive Firsts

This will be a series of the automotive firsts like the first car maker to add as standard equipment one of the normal standard equipment that we expect as standard today such as windshield wipers, automatic transmission, power steering, power brakes, A/C, heaters, self-starting, radios, etc.

Early Navigational Devices

1930 Iter Avto

Designed and created in the 1930s, it's more like a "map guidance tool" since it didn't really give voice prompts and directions and, of course, it didn't use satellites.



The device came with a set of paper maps. These were wrapped from one roll to another across a display and a cable connected to the speedometer controlled the scroll rate. The speed with which the display moved was proportional to the speed of the car so it always showed the correct point. The big problem was that the moment you drifted from your route, you would have to load a new map and find the exact spot of your current location.

GPS Navigation

The design of GPS is based partly on similar ground-based radio-navigation systems, such as LORAN and the Decca Navigator System, developed in the early 1940s. Even though GPS technology started in the early '70s, it is far from the GPS of today. The biggest problem in those days was putting heavy, expensive equipment in the limited space of a car interior. Honda started experimenting in the early '80s, but the first car with a factory installed GPS navigation system was the 1986 Toyota Soarer for the Japanese market.

FIRST TRACTOR-TRAILER UNIT

A Model T Runabout had the honor of becoming the tractor for the world's first commercially built and sold tractor-trailer unit. This trailer was designed and built in 1914 to order for the Sibley Lumber Company, of Detroit, by the local wagon building, August Fruehauf. The trailer was fitted to a turntable mounted on a 1911 Ford Runabout which had already been converted to a one-ton truck with the patented "Smith Form-A-Truck" equipment. An immediate demand for similar trailers launched the Fruehauf Corporation as pioneer trailer builders. In this unit, first of our most important modern freight vehicles, was restored by the Fruehauf Corporation and given to the Henry Ford Museum, where it is now displayed.
