

Who's interested and what questions do you have? If you are interested please send a photo of your car as I suspect they will ask for that.




Secretary's Report

Meeting minutes November 19, 2025

Glen called the meeting to order at 6:58 PM.

There were 16 members in attendance and one guest. Glen ask our guest, Kathryn Mattison, to introduce herself. She is from Austin Wildlife Rescue. Kathryn is the guest speaker for the meeting.

Glen stated that the meeting minutes were included in the last Newsletter and ask for if they were good.

George moved to accept the minutes as posted. Randy and Pat, and maybe others, seconded the motion.

Treasurer's report: Jan stated that all but 4 current members have paid their dues for 2026.

Glen reminded everyone to pay their National Dues if they had not already done so.

Officer Nominations: Glen asked Tom to present his nomination committee results. Tom thanked Joe for his help on this. Then nominations are as follows: President - Glen Gillman - Vice President - Gary Baker - Treasurer - Randy Brown - Secretary - no nominations but after some discussion Joe Pinnelli agreed to be a provisional secretary until January when a new choice is found. At large board member - Jeff Treadwell

Glen suggested that if wanted officers may move positions if that helps to gets a secretary volunteer. Glen asked Richard to take notes for one more month, January. He agreed if he is able to attend the meeting in January.

Tom made a motion to approve the 5 officers listed above. Bob made a second to the motion. The new officers are elected and begin their terms in December.

Kingsbury report: It was noted than Glen was not in attendance. It was about a 1 hour drive there from Joe's place and 1 hour back. Though there were some issues with cars on the way back (oil and coils). Our club had 6 cars in the event. There was a parade of cars around the airfield area. The weather was perfect. The vendors were thin. There were just an average number of participants. There were only a few planes participating.

The cobbler order was taken.


Presentation: Austin Wildlife Rescue with Kathryn Mattison giving the presentation. They have been in Austin since 1977. They rescue, rehabilitate, and release animals back into the wild. This past year they dealt with over 10,000 animals and within those over 300 species. They have three norelease animals that they use for educational purposes. A Texas Tortoise (Tortellini), a raccoon (Herbie), and a squirrel (Lady Bird). Their rescue location is on East Martin Luther King but will soon be moving to 13th street. Their rehabilitation location is in Elgin. They are funded mostly by donations with some grants as well.

Kathryn talked a lot about different native to Texas animals and explained what they do in the environment. She also talked about some of the unusual steps taken to rescue some animals such as drilling holes in an armadillo shell to allow them to stitch up a cracked shell. And super gluing wings onto a butterfly. Or how often birds must be fed each day, every 20 minutes. They go to great lengths to keep the animals wild so they can survive once they are released.

She obviously loves the animals and the work she is doing.

After the presentation George moved to conclude the meeting. Bob seconded the motion, along with many others, and the meeting concluded at 8:11 PM.

Automotive Firsts

This will be a series of automotive firsts, like the first car manufacturer to add as standard equipment and one of the standard equipment that we expect on our normal cars of today. This is like windshield wipers, automatic transmission, power brakes, etc.

In-Car Radio

American inventor and self-described "Father of Radio", Lee de Forest, demonstrated a car radio at the 1904 Louisiana Purchase Exposition in St. Louis. There was a time when listening to a radio in the car was considered extremely dangerous because the driver's attention was on the broadcast, not on the road ahead.


The first attempt to put a radio in cars was in the early '20s, but it was too expensive and complicated. The very first car radio to ever be introduced came about in 1922, courtesy of Chevrolet. But it wasn't at all like the car radio you may envision these days. It wasn't a nice, relatively small box that could fit neatly into your dashboard. In fact, it was anything but convenient: it was a monstrosity that took up a ton of space.

It needed an antenna that was so large it pretty much covered the roof of the car. The speakers were massive and had to be attached to the back of the seat, and the batteries to power the whole setup were so large they barely managed to fit under the seat of most cars. To top all of that off, this entire setup cost \$200.

If that doesn't sound like much, it's because you are forgetting that it is 1922 in this scenario. \$200 in 1922 was approximately \$3,153 in today's money. If you wanted music with your ride, it was not going to be cheap. Such is the way of technology when it is almost brand new. It takes a long time for it to become cheap!


It's worth noting that this doesn't really tell us the exact make and model of the first car to have a car radio. Chevrolet didn't make a car radio as a built-in feature of a particular model in 1922; they just made a car radio that could be fitted to different Chevy cars if a customer was willing to pay that crazy price for it.

However, when the Motorola Company presented its compact radio in the early '30s, installing radios became much easier. In fact, Chevrolet was the first company to offer it as a regular production option.




100-Year-Old 1926 Ford Model TT Pickup Truck




1926 Ford Model T 2-Dr Sedan
